FROM THE PASTOR:

Today's gospel reading reflects upon the ten commandments. We see them on the sides of buildings, government buildings and most people can repeat many of these commandments. To the people of Israel, these ten commandments, or what they would call the ten words, were important because it became really the structure for their entire system of what they will do and what they will not do. If one doesn't know the context of the ten commandments, one will simply think that these are rules and regulations to limit a person in terms of their religious experience.

I have heard people say: "You Catholics, you are a faith of rules and regulations. Eat this, don't eat that, on Sunday you have to go to church" and the list goes on. People don't like to be told what to do. Our relationship with God isn't just focusing on the commands, do's and don'ts.

The ten commandments are an expression of the love between God and His people in the context of a covenant. A covenant is where there's a sharing of persons, there's a sharing of lives, and an oath is sworn and there are terms to the covenant. In Israel's case here, God is going to make a covenant with Israel and we're going to see the stipulations of that covenant. That covenant should be interpreted in terms of a love relationship, not a tyrannical leadership trying to control our lives. If God and Israel are entering into a relationship, there has to be certain guidelines.

The ten commandments are not imposed on us. They are expressions of the covenant love that we have with God. We should interpret all that we are commanded to do from the context of a covenant relationship. The ten commandments are a wonderful treasure that we have as Catholics expressing of a deep love and a covenantal relationship with Jesus.
